HRHA continues to focus on achieving its goals and objectives established for 2022. These include expanding housing options within the City, preserving affordable housing, improving housing choice, and increasing resources to address the housing needs in our community.

These are significant goals established by the Board of Commissioners to address local housing challenges and implement evidence-based, long-term solutions. HRHA is currently finalizing its rezoning application for the Bluestone Town Center, developing construction plans for the Lineweaver renovation project, applying for funding to develop another permanent supportive housing development to address the needs of the unhoused, and applying for resources to further expand rental assistance.

All of these initiatives are in addition to our core housing functions of rental assistance, property management, supportive services, and homeless services coordination.

HRHA recognizes that achievement is only possible due to staff's commitment to the mission and vision and the on-going community support provided to address these community needs and challenges.



HRHA manages a variety of programs, grants, and initiatives. We serve hundreds of families through housing vouchers, programs like Family Self-Sufficiency, and city-wide campaigns. Through 2022, we plan to highlight members of the HRHA team who make this work possible.

1. What is one of your favorite aspects of working at HRHA?

We are about to implement a new program called Moving to Work. Moving to Work is so exciting—our families will have more opportunities to become self-sufficient, we'll have more opportunities to recruit new landlords into our Housing Choice Voucher program and work closely with our existing landlords, and we'll be able to re-conceptualize the work of our Housing Choice Voucher team, giving them the chance to work more closely with our families and landlords. Our staff has so many great ideas for this program! I can't wait to integrate staff ideas and see the benefits of this new program for the families we serve.

Of course! Last year, we implemented a new software program, and I keep hearing stories (I didn't work here yet) about how the team came together during that time.
